BRIDGES Helps Guardian Storage Build Two Locations in Bethel Park



Guardian Storage has proudly grown to become the market leader of self-storage services. With 16 locations in the greater Pittsburgh area and four in Colorado, Guardian Storage continues to grow by leaps and bounds.

So, when they needed help building not one, but two locations just a half mile away from each other in Bethel Park, PA, we stepped right in to help.

The first building is facing Route 88 and is going to be equipped with a rental office and will have a display window on an angled wall that highlights storage units and lockers to motorists passing by on the busy intersection. The second, three-story building is located on Milford Drive and totals 106,000 square feet.

For these projects in particular, we had to overcome some challenges in order to stay on schedule. For instance, the construction site for the first building along Route 88 is extremely tight and is surrounded by a small stream on two sides of the building. Because of this, our team has to provide even

more attention-to-detail than normal to ensure the safety of all involved on the project site.

Additionally, our team had to work with a soil improvement company to help pump grout piers on a 10' x 10' grid under the entire second building's construction site to prevent the building from settling.

Despite these obstacles, both buildings are scheduled to open early next year to the residents of Bethel Park and its surrounding areas.

Thanks to marketing director, Candice Puzak and her team at Guardian Storage and Jeff Michelson and his team at Desmone Architects for their collaboration on this project. BRIDGES Team Helps Navigate DriveTime Project to Completion

DriveTime, an automotive group from Tempe, AZ, currently has 146 dealerships in 27 states and is the nation’s second largest vehicle retailer that’s focused solely on used cars.

In 2016, the company turned to BRIDGES to help construct a brand-new location on McKnight Road in Ross Township.

Two years later, they were looking to expand their operations in the area and called on our team to help remodel a new dealership in Baldwin, PA.

This project in particular is a remodel of an existing two-story building with a basement that totals 4,757 square feet.

As you know, in the construction world, you can plan to your heart’s content, but as soon as you get to work, those plans seem to be thrown to the wayside because of unexpected issues.

When it came to this project in particular, we were tasked with demolishing the second floor of the building and leaving the first floor perimeter block walls intact.

However, during demolition, we began to uncover existing structural conditions to this portion of the building.

“It was decided by BRIDGES, DriveTime, and the engineering team at Gallery Interiors, that we would complete the demolition of the first floor down to the foundation block and then pour concrete to connect the first floor existing slab with the existing foundation block,” said Ken Reece, BRIDGES superintendent.

As the project progressed, our team, along with the team at Gallery Interiors, came together to redesign some of the work to transform this building from an “as-is” block structure, to a new, structurally-framed, single-story building.

Despite these roadblocks, we were able to keep the project moving forward in the right direction towards completion.

We’d like to thank the teams at DriveTime and Architectural Innovations for their collaboration on this project.
